another set of Harmony Queens in the Sound Pipers.

One of the highlights of this convention was the appearance of our dear Barbara-Ann MacIntosh, albeit in a wheelchair, courageously performing with RHODE ISLAND SOUND following cancer surgery on her leg. Always an inspiration to us all, Barbara-Ann was never more so than at that convention, frightened, in pain, but singing her heart out and boosting everyone's spirits with her happy smile.


We regretted the resignation of Donna Lee Jefferson, who had served as our Executive Secretary so long and well, but we were excited about the creation of the MacIntosh Award for the small chorus scoring the highest in competition.

Most notable was the decision to adopt as our charity the National



Societies for Autistic Children, giving us a new challenge and new goal. This worthy organization has since benefitted by thousands of dollars donated by our chapters and members.

New Area demarkation lines were approved, with seven Areas now defined. A Harmony training team was established, to be known as H.I.T. It was decided that THE KEY-NOTE would be issued four times a year, effective 1976, qualifying for the second class mailing rate. The Board rescinded a decision by the 1960 Board that the Harmony Creed replace the Code of Ethics, thus reinstating the Code.


